
Vigla: Excavation Unit 1

Summary: Vigla Excavation Unit 1 was excavated from 30 May to 10 June 2008. The unit produced a sizeable ceramic assemblage and metal, bone, shell, and stone material. The predominant feature uncovered was a 0.50 meter wide wall running roughly north/south through the trench. The trench appears to represent a single-phase habitation site dating to the Classical-Hellenistic period. The material west of the wall represents sediments on the exterior of the building, while the soils to the east of the wall constitute an interior space, based on the presence of a clear floor surface and higher artifact densities. Finds of interest include four coins, a broken lead sling bullet, and evidence for lead sling bullet production in the form of casting debris, all of which were found on the floor level to the east of the wall.
